STATE BY STATE: TLAXCALA

The generous weather of Tlaxcala is ideal to visit it any day of the year. Despite being a small state, Tlaxcala offers many options to have fun. It is a place to get in touch with nature, to practice extreme sports such as rappelling or mountain biking, as well as a place where one can observe the most interesting ecosystems, including majestic volcanoes. During a visit to the city of Tlaxcala, the tourist will be surprised by a picturesque landscape of houses with brightly colored facades, as well as an interesting collection of colonial buildings dating from the sixteenth century, which are still immaculately preserved. The main square of the city offers reminiscences of the Colonial architecture, which is a clear exhibit of the importance that the city had during the New Spain period, which is shown in its extraordinary architectonic common property of baroque and *churrigueresque* styles.

Just in the center is the Plaza de la Constitución, where twenty eight archways form a majestic gateway to welcome visitors. In the north side of the square is the Government Palace, where one can enjoy the colorful murals of Desiderio Hernández Xochitiotzin, from Tlaxcala, in which he narrates the history of the state, from the pre-Hispanic period to the present day.

On the murals of the government palace of Tlaxcala, one can learn about the history and geography of Tlaxcala. On them, their warriors are depicted, achieving a victory for their independence against the Mexica people. These majestic paintings show the arrival of the Spanish conquerors and the peace and military aid agreements accomplished with the natives, who wished to defend from their traditional enemies.

PANORÁMICA LATIN AMERICAN FILM FESTIVAL IN STOCKHOLM

From Thursday 22 to Sunday 25 September, Klarabiografen, Cinema Zita Folkets Bio and Bio Rio will be filled with the best new Latin American cinema. Inspired by its successful first edition, Panorámica has designed a program composed by 18 titles produced in 11 countries from the region during 2014 and 2015, two discussion seminars, and other events related to Latin America and its cinema.

This year, PANORAMICA will open with the Colombian film *Embrace of the Serpent* directed by Ciro Guerra, in which one of the central topics is memory. In addition to being one of the most important topics for Latin American societies today, memory is the leitmotif of the 2016 program, which will emphasize the power that documentary cinema has for the construction of collective memory and the struggle of indigenous communities to defend the environment, their territories and ways of life.

Mexican productions participating in this year's festival are: <u>A Monster With a Thousand Heads</u>, directed by Rodrigo Plá; <u>Beyond my Grandfather Allende</u> (a México-Chile production), directed by Marcia Tambutti Allende; and <u>Kings of Nowhere</u>, directed by Betzabé García, who will take part in a seminar as well.

YOUNG MEXICANS WIN WATER PRIZE IN STOCKHOLM



Ambassador Gasca Pliego attended the award ceremony for the Stockholm Junior Water Prize by SIWI, the Stockholm International Water Institute, the evening of August 30 at the Grand Hotel. In its 20th edition, which had the theme "Water for Sustainable Growth," this award ceremony brought together young scientists and innovators from around the world who seek to create solutions to the growing global water-related problems.

The organizing committee invited 29 finalists from different countries to the ceremony, including representatives from the United States, Canada, Germany, Israel, France, Finland, Norway, Sweden and the United Kingdom, among others. The team from Thailand was awarded the Main Prize, while the Mexican team received the only Diploma of Excellence in the contest. Both awards were presented by Prince Carl Philip of Sweden.

The Mexican team consisted of students from the CBTIS 165 Leona Vicario School, from the state of Veracruz: Gabriel David Alejandro Trujillo, Eunice Yaneli Masegoda Gaona and Carlos Castellanos Dominguez, who presented a draft system of wastewater treatment that combines artificial wetland, a process of purification by electricity, and a purification process that promotes the use of treated water in small agricultural and/or school activities, such as its use in bathrooms and cleaning. Here, students stressed that the results of their prototype plant showed that this treatment regimen ensures the removal of organic matter, oils and fats, among other components. This project was led by Dra. Alma Chavez Mejía, Technical Academic Coordinator of Environmental Engineering at the Institute of Engineering of the National Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM), who was extremely pleased with this recognition.

"This team went right ahead to build and operate the kind of system that is often researched but rarely implemented well – if at all. Their accessible, practical solution is simple. The selection of local plants, previously undervalued, has made this innovation cost-effective to implement, and at the same time scientifically sophisticated," the Jury said.

WORLD MOURNS PASSING OF MEXICAN SINGER JUAN GABRIEL, 1950-2016

Renowned Mexican singer-songwriter Juan Gabriel, whose real name was Alberto Aguilera Valadez, died on Sunday, August 28, in his home in California. With a repertoire of some 1,500 songs, Juan Gabriel was an icon of Mexican popular culture and a mandatory reference in contemporary Spanish-language music. His collaborations with numerous international artists, translations of his songs and his awards spread the reputation of Mexican folk music around the world. With his songs, Juan Gabriel was one of the most important cultural ambassadors of Mexico. The lyrics he wrote became a cultural banner with which Mexicans proudly shared our musical diversity with the world.

A book of condolence was available to the public from August 31st to September 2nd at the Embassy of Mexico in Stockholm.
