The traditional costume and textile exhibition "¡Viva México! Clothing and Culture" at the Royal Ontario Museum (ROM) in Toronto is open to the public from May 9,2015 to May 23,2016.

The exhibition, featuring 150 textile pieces -including costumes and dresses, rebozos, huipiles, ponchos and religious ornaments- made in Mexico since the 18th century.

TRADE FACILITATION OFFICE (TFO) INFORMATION SESSION

On May 4, the Trade Facilitation Office for developing nations (TFO) organized a seminar for



accredited trade representatives of different countries based in Toronto.

The TFO operates as a non-profit organization with a mission to offer assistance to exporters from developing countries so they can introduce their products to Canada.

The seminar was presented by the TFO's representative in Ontario, Alma Farías, and the organization's Project Manager for Trade Information Services, Clarecia Christie. The objective of the event was to present the TFO's new online services and digital tools for obtaining information on international trade.

The assistance provided is through the registration of exporters' products on a Foreign Supplier Database, which is consulted by Canadian buyers who receive information from TFO Canada. Products must be registered directly on the TFO website: http://www.tfocanada.ca/
