## Support to DPPA/SCAD Trust Fund for the Updating of the *Repertoire of Practice of the Security Council* 2022 Appeal

Guided by General Assembly Resolution 54/106 (1999) and the 2020-2022 DPPA Strategic Plan, and in line with the priorities outlined in the Secretary-General's Data Strategy, the Security Council Affairs Division of the Department of Political and Peacebuilding Affairs is seeking to fund two projects pertaining to the *Repertoire of Practice of the Security Council* in 2022.

### Background

The Security Council Practices and Charter Research Branch (SCPCRB, also known as "Charter Research Branch") in the Security Council Affairs Division (SCAD) is tasked with preparing the *Repertoire of Practice of the Security Council*, a publication mandated by the General Assembly in 1952 as a source of information on the practices and procedures of the Security Council. Today, the original *Repertoire* and all subsequent volumes (also known as Supplements) form the authoritative record of the interpretation and application by the Security Council of the Charter of the United Nations and its own Provisional Rules of Procedure. The *Repertoire* is widely used by Member States, think tanks, academics researchers and the public at large.

*Purpose of the Repertoire Trust Fund:* On 9 December 1999, the General Assembly, through its resolution 54/106, endorsed the Secretary-General's proposal for Member States to consider providing voluntary contributions to eliminate the ten year back-log in publication of the *Repertoire*. Accordingly, the Trust Fund for the updating of the *Repertoire* was established by the Secretary-General with the objective of ensuring that the *Repertoire* was brought up to date. The strategy for combating this decade-long lag was to enable the establishment of an additional team of researchers that could reinforce the Charter Research Branch in SCAD to eliminate the backlog in the preparation and issuance of Supplements to the *Repertoire*.

*Use of the Repertoire Trust Fund over time:* The strategy proved successful and as of 2019, the Charter Research team eliminated the backlog and went beyond. The *Repertoire* is now an annual publication, covering single years of practice and activity of the Security Council. It is made available online in its advance form by October of every year at the same time as newly elected members commence observing proceedings, thereby supplying members of the Council with the most recent set of information (to year end) on the work of the Security Council.

The 21st Supplement to the *Repertoire* covering the year 2018 was the first volume to cover a one-year cycle. It was published on the Security Council's website in its advance version in October 2019 and its edited version (hard copy) was made available in October 2020. This regular and

predictable schedule has been formally adopted and the 22nd Supplement to the *Repertoire* covering the year 2019 was similarly made available in its advance form on the website of the Security Council in October 2020 and in hard copy in October 2021. All subsequent volumes (Supplements) since have followed this same strict schedule. The 23rd Supplement covering the period of 2020 is now available on the Security Council's website in its advance version and the Charter Research Branch is now in the process of completing the 24th Supplement (2021) and preparing for the 25th Supplement (2022).

Additionally, the Charter Research Branch has also made available user-friendly and innovative visualizations of the data used in the preparation of the *Repertoire* for its use by Member States and the public at large. Given the limited resources available, these visualizations are updated on a quarterly or annual basis. Council members have recently requested more regular information collected for the purposes of preparing the *Repertoire*.

*Use of the Repertoire Trust Fund in 2021:* Contributions received in the year 2021, a total of USD170,920 went towards the USD512,370 requested in the 2021 appeal (see **Annex I**). By means of the funds contributed in 2021 (33.35% of the total amount requested in the appeal) and optimising the use of regular budget resources available to SCAD and other departments, the Charter Research Branch was able to (i) deploy a first revamp of the existing search engine to improve access to the more than 73 years of history contained in the pages of the *Repertoire* for the benefit of Member States and the public at large, and (ii) advance the process to complete the availability of fully searchable data on Security Council decisions available in SCAD's internal database to 1946 (currently only available as of 1994). In addition, in collaboration with the Department of General Assembly and Conference Management, the Charter Research Branch was able to secure part-time additional editorial capacity to accelerate the availability of the *Repertoire* in its edited final form with a view to, in turn, reducing the time lag between the publication of the English version of the *Repertoire* and those in other UN official languages.

*Challenges ahead:* In response to Council members demand, in May 2021 the Charter Research Branch piloted the *UN Security Council in Review*, a monthly newsletter offering an overview of activities of the Council for each month. This publication provides advance information collected for the *Repertoire* and is aimed at responding to the needs of Council members. It has had a very successful reception among Council members and it has validated the need for such a product which will be made available on the Security Council website. However, to sustain the progress achieved so far in terms of data collection, analysis and visualization in preparation of the *Repertoire* and to prevent the forming of any future backlog on its publication, voluntary contributions to the Trust Fund remain critical to ensure the highest quality and the availability of the *Repertoire* and associated data through the website of the Security Council.

Improving its access and continuing to improve the accessibility of information about Security Council practice in all six official languages also remains a priority. By resolution 75/140 of 15 December 2020, the General Assembly reiterated the responsibility of the Secretary-General for the quality of the *Repertoire* and called upon him to continue his efforts towards updating the *Repertoire* and making it available electronically in all language versions. In his report to the 76th session of the General Assembly (A/76/194) of 23 July 2021, the Secretary-General underscored the need for additional contributions to the Trust Fund.

### Project Proposals

Two project proposals are contained in this appeal document. Combined, they will allow SCAD to continue its progress by maintaining the progress in the publication enabling the continued release of the Supplements in preparation by no later than the end of October each year following the closing of the year prior, and strengthening the collection and analysis of data for the preparation of each Supplement, enhancing the capacity to produce future Supplements within the established timeframe and making the data available to Member States in real time.

#### **Project Proposal I: Maintaining the progress of the annual release of supplements to the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council***

The Charter Research Branch has been successful in transitioning from a multi-year publication to an annual publication. As a result, the *Repertoire* is now available every October, as newly elected members of the Council begin observing Security Council proceedings. The now contemporary nature of the *Repertoire* has led to a renewed interest in the information contained in its pages. For example, the 23<sup>rd</sup> Supplement to the *Repertoire*, which covers 2020, is now available online and includes in great detail the far-reaching and complex new procedures developed by the Council in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. This is invaluable information for delegates of Council members seeking to understand the new procedures and practices in one single and reliable publication.

As a result of the efforts of the Charter Research Branch over time, the current status of the *Repertoire* is as follows:

While partnering with the Department of General Assembly and Conference Management to secure a 22-month schedule from the closing of the reporting period to the final, hard copy, publication of each Supplement, the Charter Research Branch is aiming for the completion and release online of the 24<sup>th</sup> Supplement (covering 2021) by October 2022 while also preparing to commence work on the 25<sup>th</sup> Supplement (covering 2022) by October 2023.

To sustain this very demanding and multi-layered schedule (from the closing of the year to the publication of all hard copies of all UN official languages), the continued financial support from Member States remains critical, particularly given the financial constraints faced by the Organization. Additional resources are thus required to ensure that the current one-year cycle as well as the release of advance versions in October every year can be sustained and avoid backlogs.

**Overall objective:**

The additional resources for the preparation of the *Repertoire* will enable SCAD to sustain the current schedule and maintaining progress while ensuring adequate quality control standards for the publication to remain authoritative and up to date.

**Requirements:**

It is envisaged that the project activities would amount to a total of USD 81,182.03 for 12 months and would require the services of a UN Volunteer.

**Project Proposal II: Strengthening and consolidating of real time data collection and data analysis for the preparation of the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council***

Over the past 5 years, the Charter Research Branch of SCAD has spearheaded a data-centered approach to its work in collaboration with the Department of General Assembly and Conference Management, the UN Library and the Office of Information and Communications Technology consistent with the Secretary-General’s Data and New Technologies Strategies. As a result, SCAD is now one of the largest providers of datasets within the Peace and Security Pillar (including via the Peace and Security Datahub), including historical and current data on Security Council membership, Chairmanship of subsidiary bodies, participation of women in the work of the Council, mandates of peacekeeping operations and special political missions as well as cross cutting themes such as Women and Peace and Security. These are all necessary datasets for the preparation of the *Repertoire*.

In recent months, Council members and other Member States have voiced the desire to access more data, more live data and more visuals on the data available concerning all aspects of the work of the Security Council. To do so, SCAD would like to raise funds to strengthen and consolidate the collection of data as well as the visual platforms currently available in partnership with the Department of General Assembly and Conference Management, the UN Library and the Office of Information and Communications Technology. This would require dedicated resources to ensure that the current quarterly or annual updates of data can be reduced to monthly or even weekly cycles, and to rely on the necessary modern technologies to be able to do so.

**Overall objective:**

The enhanced resources for data collection, data analysis and data visualization will strengthen SCAD’s data infrastructure consistent with the Secretary-General’s New Technologies and Data Strategies thereby also consolidating SCAD’s research and advisory and information capacity and enhancing the access to real time data relating to the work of the Security Council by Member States, including Council members.

**Requirements:**

It is envisaged that the project activities would amount to a total of USD 211,037.65 for 12 months and would require the services of a junior data analyst as well as the necessary access to relevant software and technologies.
